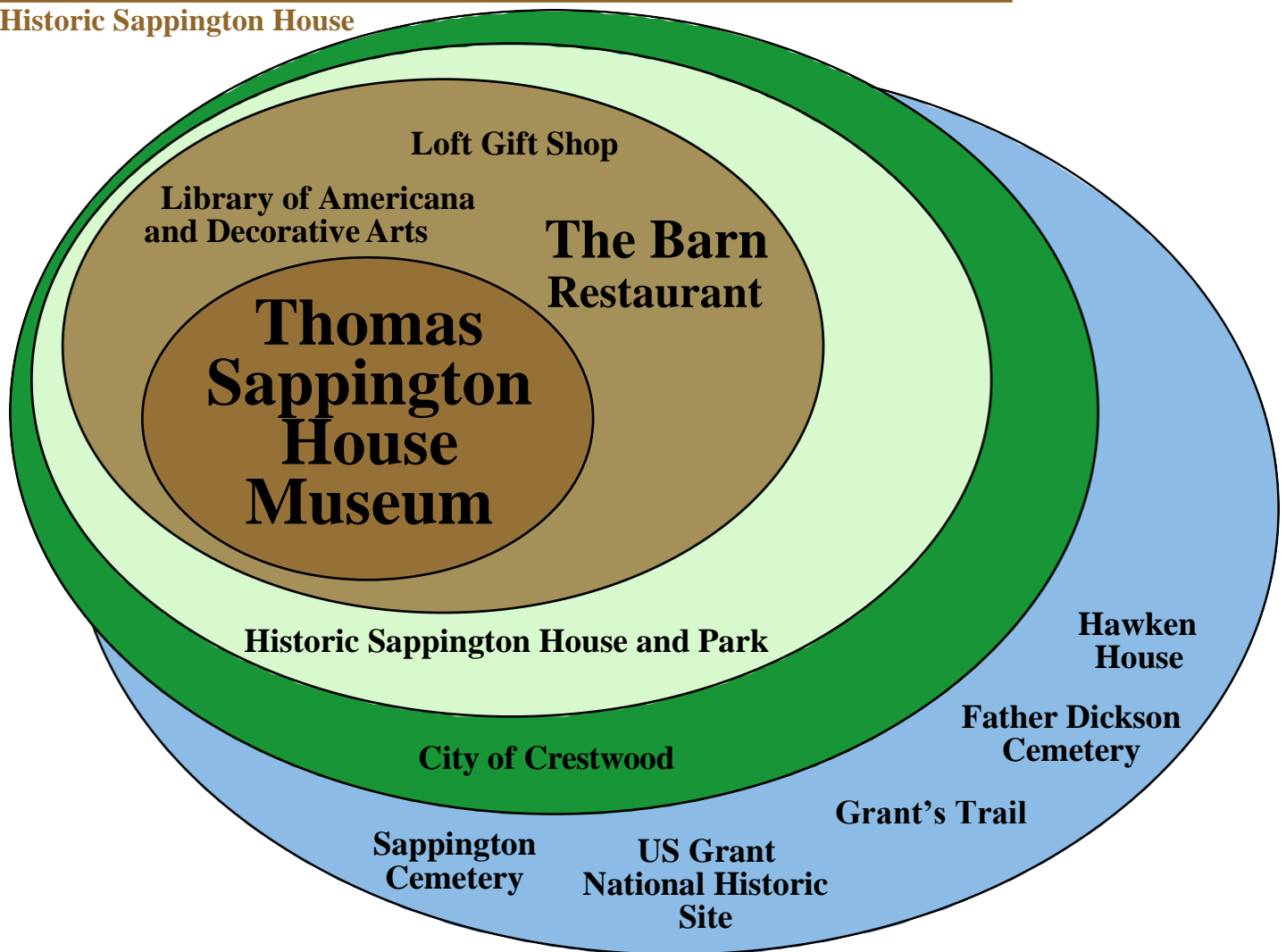


# More than a house, it's community

## Historic Sappington House



**Thomas Sappington House Museum** is the center piece of Sappington House Park and is a non-profit. The red brick, Federal style house was built by Thomas Sappington in 1808. It's open to the public with regular hours on a weekly basis and by appointment

**The Barn restaurant**, a for-profit business, offers breakfast and lunch fare with fabulous desserts six days a week, attracting people onsite for meals/special events. Indoor event and meeting space

**The Library of Americana and Decorative Arts** features reference materials on decorative arts, history and genealogy. They form the factual and intellectual basis of the historic house. The collection catalog is online with select libraries. Indoor meeting space

**The Loft Gift Shop** is located upstairs from The Barn restaurant. It offers lifestyle and garden gifts for all occasions. Financially it supports the Sappington House and educational programming

**Sappington House Park** with pond, gardens and picnic area, provides an attractive setting for a historic house, restaurant and library. The park is a verdant, outdoor event space

**City of Crestwood** maintains the park and the exterior of Sappington House. The interior and furnishings are maintained by the Sappington House Foundation, 501c3

### Neighbors

**Father Dickson Cemetery** is a 20th century African American cemetery bordering the park

**Grant's Trail**, for biking and hiking, stretches from Kirkwood far into South County, bringing visitors to the site

### Associated sites nearby

**Sappington Cemetery** on Watson Road is resting place of early generations of Sappington and neighboring families

**US Grant National Historic Site** is collaborator and resource to Sappington House

**Hawken House** in Webster Groves, is home to Thomas Sappington's granddaughter
